



Dear Parishioners,

Beginning on December 17th and continuing to December 23rd, the Church enters the period of preparation for Christmas known as the "O" Antiphons. During vespers each night, the Church prays the Magnificat, Mary's hymn after receiving the news that she was to be the Mother of God. We echo Mary's words, "My soul magnifies the Lord."

Before we say that prayer during vespers there is always a verse or antiphon. The "O" antiphons are particular to these last days of the Advent season. Each antiphon is based on a title for the Messiah from the Old Testament. By using these titles, we spiritually join with the people of the Old Testament in their hope-filled longing for the Messiah. These antiphons were later used as the basis for the hymn O Come, O Come Emmanuel. If you notice in the Peoples' Mass Book, hymn #1 notes the days on which the antiphon is to be said and while we begin the hymn with O Come, O Come Emmanuel that is the really the last antiphon that would be sung on December 23rd. Let's look at the titles for a moment with their Latin or Hebrew versions.

December 17th—O Wisdom from on high (O Sapientia)—expresses that the Messiah is the embodiment of Holy Wisdom, Christ is the wisdom and the power of God

December 18th—Our Lord of might (O Adonai)-uses a title by which God was called—The Jews would not utter the name of God (Yahweh) so they substituted other titles such as Adonai/Lord

December 19th—O Branch of Jesse's stem (O Radix Jesse)—recalls the prophesy of Isiah that predicts that from the ruined house/"stump" of David's family would come forth a new shoot

December 20th—O Key of David (O Clavis David)—the Messiah would have the authority to open and close the door of the kingdom

December 21st—O Dayspring (O Oriens)—the dawn; the Messiah was prophesied to come from the East, as the rising Sun

December 22nd—O King of the nations (O Rex Gentium)—the Messiah was not only seen to be the King of Israel but of all the nations, who would see in Him the source of truth, justice, and peace

December 23rd—O Emmanuel (O God is with us)—recalls the prophesy of Isiah to King Ahaz that a virgin will bear a son and name him Emmanuel, which means God is with us; God the Word becomes Incarnate. Even if you do not pray vespers each night, these "O" antiphons serve as a good point of reflection for our evening prayers as Christmas draws near.

Make Straight the Way of the Lord

John 1:6-8,19-28

When the priests and Levites demanded to know who John was, he didn't answer them in the way they wanted. Instead, he quoted Isaiah, saying that he was "the voice of one crying out in the desert, make straight the way of the Lord."

Throughout this Sunday's Gospel, we are reminded that we must be willing to embark on a journey if we want to come to the Faith. God sends John into the desert. The Jews from Jerusalem send priests and Levites to talk to John. The Pharisees send some of their own people to question him. And, finally, John says that the Messiah will be sent after him. Not only that, people had to travel out to the desert if they wanted to experience John's baptism of repentance.

One of the lessons for this Third Week of Advent is that if we want to meet the Lord, we need to be willing to seek him. We must go out into the deserts of our lives with the expectation that we will find Jesus there. However, we must also be willing to "see" him. As John said, "there is one among you whom you do not recognize."

As we begin the final stages of Advent preparation, may we be "witnesses to the light," and may our hearts and minds turn more fully to the coming of the Christ this week.

FAMILY FOCUS

Advent Around the World

This year, add a little international flavor to your Advent with these family activities from around the world.

INDIA Mango leaves are typically used for Advent decorations in India, and instead of decorating pines trees,

mango and banana trees are trimmed. Add a bowl of mangoes and small white lights, which recall the Star of Bethlehem, to your table.

PHILIPPINES Advent is marked by attending Mass nine days in a row (called Simbág Gabi, "night mass," or Misas de Aguinaldo, "gift Masses"), starting on December 16. If you can't make it to Mass all nine days, try to attend at least a few days of daily Mass.

EUROPE In Alpine countries,

children carry a statue of Saint Joseph to a different home each night during Advent. Carry the statue of Joseph from your crèche to each child's room where it will spend the night and then move on the next day. On Christmas Eve, put Joseph next to Mary in the stable.

HEROES OF HOPE

SAINT PETER CANISIUS

Advent is an ideal time of year to talk about the Faith and invite those who do not believe to consider the mystery of God-made-man in Jesus Christ. It is fitting

that we celebrate the feast of Saint Peter Canisius this week, because he was a great evangelist. A Jesuit preacher during the time of the

Protestant reformation, he became a major factor in the restoration of the Catholic Church in Germany. Like Pope Francis, he believed in treating those who disagree with

the teaching of the Church with kindness and patience. His devotion to Mary was a hallmark of his ministry, and he is credited with adding the words "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners" to the Hail Mary. Saint Peter Canisius, pray for us!

SIGNS OF THE SEASON

In the Pink

Deep purple is the liturgical color for Advent except for the third Sunday, which is Gaudete Sunday. This week the liturgical vestments and the candle in the Advent wreath are a rosy pink to highlight the joy that the Lord's coming is almost here. The name derives from the Latin words of the Introit to the Mass: "Gaudete in Domino semper; iterum dico, gaudete": "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice!"
